

The park's history is associated with the nation's father as he rested upon a golden 'Katte' (boulder). It is now known as 'Gandhi's Katte'. The municipality does the park's maintenance as the boulder is an integral part of the park. The district tourism office has also supported the initiative. The estimation of the initiative is around Rs 1.35 crores.

M Kurma Rao, Deputy Commissioner said that promoting tourism in Bhu-

janga Park is an example Udupi: Bhujanga is one of development. Clifford Lobo, the deputy director in charge of the district tourism department, said, "Rs 35 lakh had already been released by Udupi CMC, while the tourism department will invest Rs 1 crore. Malpe fishermen face a strange problem of catching an unwanted species of fish known as 'Red-toothed Triggerfish', a.k.a Kargil fish.

Roopesh, a fisherman, told the Indian Express, "We venture into the sea expecting prawns, squid, and sardines, and if Kargil fish fall into our net, they will dent our business prospects." Satish Kunder, Former President of Malpe Fishermen Association, told Deccan Herald, "Fish meal industries purchase this fish for Rs. 12 per kg. If it is cut and sold, then fishermen get 16 per kg."

The origin of its name


dates back to the 1999 Kargil War, when a fisherman from Karnataka first caught this fish. It has thick, problematic skin and is disapproved of for its foul odour.

Fisherman Ashok to the Indian Express, "The catch of other fish varieties is comparatively better this season as good catch of squid and prawns is also helping them supply frozen fish varieties to importing countries." Kannada Language Learning Act Challenged by 10 Year-Old-Boy

Keerthan Suresh, a student of Class 4 at Bishop Cotton Boys School from Bangalore, filed a petition challenging the Kannada Language Learning Act, 2015, before the Karnataka High Court on 23rd September 2021.

Under Section 2 of the Act, Kannada must be taught as a mandatory subject from Class 1 to 10 as either a first language or a second language in every school in Karnataka.

The 10-year-old, represented by his mother N Sujatha, a child rights activist, solicited the court to proclaim the Act as unconstitutional, illegal as it does not favour institutions affiliated with CBSE/ICSE boards. The petitioner said, "Coercion to study a regional language as a first or second language transgresses rights under Articles 14, 19, and

21. It sets a significant load on the student's shoulder." The plea stated, "The law imposes unreasonable restrictions and violates Article 19 and 30 of the Constitution. It does not take into account the students being resettled in the state after the transfer of parents."

As per the order from the education department under the Kannada Language Learning Rules 2017, the petitioner's school's principal has informed the students that Kannada will be taught as a second language. On the other hand, preferred languages will be pursued as a third language from 2020-2021 for classes 1 to 4. The bench, led by Justice R. Devdas ordered the notice to be sent to the Karnataka government.

Groundbreaking Anti-Cancer Invention in Mangalore University Gets Patented

Mangalore: K.R. Chandrashekar and Bhagya Nekrakalaya have made Mangalore University proud by obtaining its first patent for an invention that helps with the extraction and purification of tetrandrine, an anti-cancer compound from methanol extract of Cyclea peltata, known in Kannada as Haade Balli. Nekrakalaya is a UGC Women Scientist Post-Doctoral Fellow at Yenepoya Deemed to be University, Mangaluru and Chandrashekar, an advisor, Internal Quality Assurance Cell, and a professor of Botany at Yeneopoya Deemed to be University.

The Patent Office issued the patent (No. 369124) to the researchers on June 11, 2021, valid for 20 years from May 8, 2017. Chandrashekar told *The Hindu*, "Cyclea pel-

tata is an ethno medicinally important plant used for various health problems and is reported to have anti-toxin function, including playing a role in improving skin-related diabetic disorders, such as boils or carbuncle, and the treatment of smallpox". Chandrashekar further stated, "Tetrandrine previously isolated from Stephania tetrandra, an ethnomedicinal plant in China that was reported to show anti-cancer, antimicrobial, anti-inflammatory, antidiabetic, antioxidant, immunosuppressive, diovascular, and calcium channel blocking effects".

The two researchers discovered the presence of tetrandrine in *Haade balli* and then, using cancer cells, tested its anticancer potential.

Further, using a simple glass column chromatogra-

phy technique, they created a simple process for its plant's extraction and purification into a single molecule from a complex mixture.

"Recrystallised fractions yielded tetrandrine with a purity of 98.63%. Further work on this molecule for increasing its solubility in aqueous medium and clinical trials may lead to the development of a potent anti-cancer drug from a local plant," the researchers said, as reported by *The Hindu*.

Speaking to ETV Bharat, "Chandrashekar said, "Mangalore University got a patent but funds are needed to carry out further research. Therefore, if any pharmaceutical company joins hands with the university, anti-cancer medicine will be out."

Facial Recognition Systems in India: Our Big-gest Invasion of Privacy

SQ Masood after being wrongfully stopped and photographed by Telangana police, the Internet Freedom Foundation (IFF) served a legal notice to the Commissioner on May 31 on Masoods' behalf – pointing out that the incidents that took place are illegal and violate our constitutional Right to Privacy. The identification of Prisoners Act, 1920 only allows the police to photograph people arrested or convicted of a crime.

The IFF explained that this technology uses algorithms to extract data points from a person's face to create a digital signature of it. This digital signature is then compared to mapped faces in existing databases to find facial matches. This technology is highly inaccurate and poses a massive threat to Privacy and Freedom of Speech and Expression. Usage of this technology has increased as multiple government facial recognition projects are developed and

deployed across the country. The most dangerous issue is the system's inherent bias; computers and AI can't be biased, but the people who develop the databases to facilitate machine learning can, and plenty of studies prove this. The IFF has continued to campaign for India's Right to Privacy.

Most databases are developed in Western countries, so, inevitably their databases aren't built for India's vast range of races. Those that can't be correctly identified will be put at risk of being falsely implicated in crimes they never committed. In many cases, minorities are usually the testing grounds for tech experiments, and in our country that means lower socio-economic classes and religious minorities.

The Business Insider reported that many researchers fear the uninformed enthusiasm that Indians have for introducing FRT in our country, as the legislature surrounding the use of this technology is vague and can easily be manipulated to fall in line with the interests of any individual or group, which is scary considering the anti-Muslim sentiment that is becoming more prevalent in India day by day.

In December last year, The Hindu reported that the Delhi police was comparing the details of people involved in violence during the Anti-Citizenship Act protests in Jamia Millia Islamia with a data bank of more than two lakh anti-social elements. The police may also be able to use FRT to identify and penalize people at protests. This infringes upon an individual's Freedom of Speech and Expression and might lead to the government tracking us all the time - especially targeted groups.

The high detection failure rates of FRT are even grimmer as the Delhi Police told the courts in 2018 that its FRT had an accuracy of only 2%, and only one in seven FRT queries were accurate. This puts a vast majority of innocent people at risk, especially in India, where a marginal error of 1% is still 1.3 crore people.

Democracies around the world guarantee liberty to their citizens, especially people like Masood, who work hard to stand up for Muslims in our country. To be free within society from oppressive restrictions imposed by authority on one's religion or political opinions.

Turning a Blind Eye To Safety Protocols

Do you know what is the first thing that people do when they hear the fire alarm ring? They ignore it and continue their work. We Indians ignore life safety protocols and only understand the gravity of its importance when the situation

dealing with fire, and instructions should be taken seriously from a young age. Awareness about the dangers, instilling habits and following the protocols will ensure that safety at home, workplace and schools are followed. Despite how educated one is, we still take safety for granted. Awareness about safety is not prioritized, nor is it being emphasized, but we realize its importance at the time of the accident. The major causes of fires in India are primarily due to violations of safety norms and standardization of protocols, poor storage of

goods in storage units, and faulty building construction structures. There is a lack of fire stations in densely populated cities, which is dangerous because they need to reach the location as soon as possible to control the damage. Sadly, our country's fire-fighting infrastructure and fire services are lacking Safety is essential when in resources. According to the Ministry of Home Affairs, more than 140 towns with over one lakh populations have insufficient fire safety resources.

To be prepared for future situations, fire drills and preventive measures need to be taken when children are in schools itself. Nevertheless, these drills are not taken seriously anywhere in our schools, offices, and building complexes. During fire drills, people ignore the alarms thinking it is a mistake and respond only if it prolongs for a long time. They slowly move downstairs, taking their sweet

time to assemble at the safety area. We need to be alert and scan our surroundings for immediate danger and help those unaware of the situation. There needs to be awareness of handling the safety equipment, but hardly anyone knows how to use fire extinguishers in a dire situation. If a serious situation arises, the incident will stay in people's minds for two days and then it all vanishes. According to the National Crimes Record Bureau, annually, 25,000 people die due to fire accidents in India.

We need to start valuing human lives and ensure that appropriate systems and measures are kept to avoid such casualties. Why is it that the same Indians who don't follow the rules in our country become diligent and law-abiding in a foreign land? As a society, we need to be proactive instead of reactive and prepare in advance for such situations

and not think about safety as we face adversity as it happens. We can begin discussing safety in schools as part of their curriculum until higher education, ensuring annual mock drills that cover fire, road safety, natural disasters, and shootings. As India develops itself to create 'smart cities', we still fail to implement safety rules at grassroots levels. With a population of 1.3 billion people, we need to begin educating the masses about safety and precaution. The government authorities and protection agencies need to coordinate to implement these awareness drills from the smallest villages to the big cities.

As long as we ensure that safety education is prioritized, any action to prioritize human lives will lead India to become a better version of itself. So, when does this change really begin?

US Holds Summit with Indo-Pacific Leaders

Biden and his fellow Democrats (including Australian Prime Minister Scott Morrison, Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi, and Japanese Prime Minister Yoshihide Suga) are all dealing with growing China issues and meeting the main agenda of the 'Free Indo-Pacific' movement.

Following the construction of military structures on reclaimed islands in the South China Sea that function as critical global waterway and trade routes, Biden has accused the Republic of coercing economic tactics and disturbing military activity

as reported by The Hindu. Members of the Quad regard this as a possible danger to free trade and travel. According to Japan Today, they did not mention China as they met for the group's first-ever offline gathering, but China was a significant topic in private discussions. The leaders released a joint statement following the summit, promising to "respond to challenges to the rule-based maritime order, notably in the East and South China Seas."

The Quad leaders also announced that Japan and India would collaborate on a \$100 million COVID-19

vaccine and treatment medication investment. They have started a project to improve semiconductor supply chains and announce a new fellowship program for graduate students in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics who want to study at premier colleges in the United States. Biden said that the US and like-minded allies must work together on dealing with the COVID-19 pandemic, climate change, and other fundamental issues. Modi described the grouping as a 'force for global good' and said it would ensure global peace and prosperity.

The Quad is an informal alliance formed in the aftermath of the 2004 Indian Ocean tsunami, which claimed the lives of almost 230,000 people. Biden has tried to reunite the partnership by focusing on a key foreign policy goal: 'Paying more attention to the Pacific and a rising China.' The alliance also met virtually earlier this year and announced plans to increase vaccine manufacture in India.

Vaccine Apartheid: Africa Cries, West Plays Deaf?

African countries with limited or no access to life-saving Covid-19 vaccines have sent their urgent requests directly to state leaders of wealthier nations at the United Nations' Annual General Assembly. The recurring theme was, "No one is secure unless we are all safe."

"The virus knows no continents, borders, nations, or social statuses," Chad's President Mahamat Idriss Déby Itno said at a summit in New York for country leaders. "The countries and regions that are not vaccinated will be a source of propagating and developing new variants of the virus. In this regard, we welcome the repeated appeals of the United Nations Secretary-General and the Director-General of the World Health Organisation in favour of access to the vaccine for all. The salvation of humanity depends on it."

The South African President Cyril Ramaphosa pointed to vaccines as the greatest weapon against such pandemics, while also pointing fingers at the world he taunted, "It is, therefore, a great concern that the global community has not sustained the principles of solidarity and cooperation."

Many African countries require vaccines. At the UNGA, many countries stood resolute to another era of 'Apartheid'. The African countries stand in solidarity against this discrimination bringing history to the present yet again. Furthermore, while a significant part of the world cries in despair, pain and loss, the appeal for vaccines continues to roar on the western grounds.



The US Approves \$1 Billion to Fund Israel's Missile Defence System 'Iron Dome'

The US House of Representatives on September 23rd approved \$1 billion as funds to resupply Israel's missile defence system 'Iron Dome'. The controversial bill was passed just two days after it was removed from an emergency funding bill after objections from the progressive Democrats.

The Iron Dome funds bill exposes the difference between Democrats towards its close ally, Israel. The progressive Democrats of the House have accused Israel of human rights violations. "We cannot be talking only about Israelis need for safety when Palestinians are living under a violent apartheid system and are dying from

war crimes," said Representative Rashida Tlaib, Democrat of Michigan. The Liberals defended the funding of the Iron Dome as they noted that Iron Dome protected more than 90% of rockets launched from Palestine as it saved many civilian lives.

The US Congress has always maintained bipar-

tisan support from both Democrats and Republicans towards Israel. In an official statement, the Prime Minister of Israel, Naftali Bennett, thanked both parties for their support. He further mentioned that "Those who try to challenge this support got a resounding response today."

According to *The New York Times*, the \$1 billion funds are intended to replace missile interceptors in the Iron Dome defence system, which were used to destroy rockets fired from Gaza during the conflict in May. Israel's Iron Dome missile defence system intercepted more than 90% of the rockets launched from Hamas.

IMF Chief Accused of Data Manipulation.

Kristalina Geogieva, the President of the International Monetary Fund, has been accused of encouraging her staff to alter statistics while heading the World Bank. According to law firm

to alter statistics while heading the World Bank. According to law firm WilmerHale, she has pressured her team to distort data to make China's business climate appear more favourable.

The Bulgarian economist slammed the report's conclusions as being misleading. She has accused Jim Kong Kim, the former World Bank President, of manipulation. She claimed she intervened to prevent a suggestion from one of his colleagues to include Hong Kong statistics in China's ranking in the World Bank's Doing Business 2018 report, which would have improved the country's standing. Even

though Georgieva has denounced the investigation publicly, she went into deeper detail in her statement to the IMF EB, a copy of which was obtained by Reuters on Friday. "My colleagues and I at the World Bank were accused of an incorrect and spurious allegation of inflating a country's Doing Business ranking in exchange for capital commitments," she reported to the *UK Times*.

"To be clear: no such thing happened and would never happen under my leadership," Georgieva said, adding that her efforts to prevent Hong Kong's data from being included in China's Doing Business ranking highlighted her care for the World Bank's data quality.

Gangsters Killed In Courtroom Shootout in Delhi

Gunmen dressed as lawyers killed notorious Delhi gangster Jitender 'Gogi' Mann in a Delhi courtroom. Special force personnel escorting the gangster killed both attackers on the spot. The shootout left several people injured. The gunmen were identified as members of a rival gang named 'Tillu Gang'. They were plotting to kill Gogi when he was brought for his court hearing today, said the police.

"Two from a rival gang opened fire at Jitender Gogi inside the court. The police acted swiftly and killed both the assailants," said Rakesh Asthana, Deputy Commissioner to *NDTV*. Lalit Kumar, a lawyer, told the *Siliguri Observer*: "The judge was in court, lawyers were present and Jitender Gogi was there. These two shooters, who looked like 'lawyers', started shooting. A woman intern was also hit by a bullet."

The two gangs have had a long-standing enmity for years that initially began as a friendship between Gogi and Tillu Tajpuria, which later deteriorated, and resulted in the death of over 25 people. The police considered the arrest of Gogi in March 2020 as a colossal achievement. A month before his arrest, Gogi and his associates ambushed a man they thought was supporting his rivals - shooting him 48 times.

The incident has brought questions regarding the tampering of the metal detectors at the court to light. "The question of whether the metal detectors were not working in the court premises is a matter of investigation and I cannot comment on that at the moment. We are already investigating the case and we shall not spare anyone who is involved in this shootout. No one will be spared. Delhi Police is doing its job seriously. We were effective and focused, and that is why the shooter was successfully neutralized. We will say more after a detailed investigation is carried out." Asthana told *NDTV*.

200-Year-Old Mosque Run by Hindu Village in Bihar

India is a country where many cultures, languages and religions coexist. Despite an increase in communal riots and tensions in the country, the story of Bihar's Nalanda district is a rare and beautiful example of liberalism and trust amongst religions.

The last Muslim family left the village in 1981, Hindus in the Madi village in Bihar have been taking care of a 200-year-old mosque. People have been raising funds for the mosque's upkeep and have maintained its cleanliness and well-being diligently for all these years. Although there are no Muslims left in the area and

there is no one to teach the Hindus about *Azaan*, they manage to offer prayer at the mosque five times a day with the help of technology. While speaking to *TOI*, one of the residents, "The mosque is essential to the villagers, and they make sure to come and seek blessings from the all-mighty before any critical event like a wedding or starting a new venture."

According to the locals, the area had a decent Muslim population at one point in time, but after the 1981 communal riots, most families decided to leave the village and migrate. Gautam, the mosque's caretaker, explained, "There was no one to look after the mosque after all the Muslims left, so Hindus had to step forward and do it." He also added "No one knows when or how the mosque was built, but the villagers consider it very important. Every morning and evening, people visit the mosque to pray and view it as auspicious."

Japan Taking a Positive Turn Towards LGBTQ+ Rights: Campaigners

Japan: Campaigners said Japan is at a 'tipping point' for LGBTQ rights, vowing to use the Tokyo Olympics as a catalyst for change and urging lawmakers to pass an anti-discrimination bill. With opinion polls showing increased support for LGBTQ-friendly policies, especially among younger people, the country has seen a new drive for legislation protecting rights of sexual minorities.

Yuri Igarashi, director of the LGBTQ rights group J-ALL, told The Japan Times that the proposed law could yet be passed before the parliament session ends next week. "We want them to keep their promise to the people of this country," she said, referring to the LDP's pledge during the 2019 election to "promote understanding" of LGBTQ problems. The Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games are drawing worldwide attention to how this country will deal with LGBTQ issues.

While Japan provides some rights for sexual minorities, it is still the only G7 country that does not recognise same-sex marriages. Many couples say they have difficulty renting apartments together and are even prevented from visiting hospitals. A former athlete Fumino Sugiyama, who competed on the

national women's fencing team before coming out as a transgender man said "Athletes are afraid they will disappointing their fans and families, or that they will face discrimination from their sports association, that could hinder their careers".

According to the Olympic Charter, "Every individual must have the opportunity to participate in sports, without discrimination of any sort". The Japanese society is moving from its conservative beliefs with the proposed anti-discrimination bill, which has gained traction after being stagnant for six years.

Patriarchal and pious practices have influenced women's rights tremendously throughout India's long history. The repercussions of maternal-son preference and context on the gender distinctions in education are still prevalent. The primary education system continues to suffer from many shortcomings, including a severe lack of financial resources to build a nationwide school web.

Despite the fact that girls in India are more educated today than ever, the educational disparity shown in the average school year appears

to be widening. Girls' conventional school years have nearly quadrupled in the last two decades, from 1.7 years in 1990 to 4.7 years in 2018. Within the same period, men's average educational qualification increased from 4.1 to 8.2 years. Surprisingly, this demonstrates India's potential departure from global trends; where most

countries in the world have perceived uniform improvements for both genders. We see that the number of girls going to school and getting higher education has increased, there is also the reality that the percentage altogether is incredibly low.

SSAB Trailblazes in Manufacturing the World's First Fossil-Free Steel

Sweden: One of the major contributors to greenhouse emissions is the steel industry - accounting for up to 8% of global greenhouse gas emissions. A Swedish company called SSAB has taken the first step in countering the deadly impact of greenhouse gas emissions by introducing the world's first fossil-free steel. HYBRIT, a joint initiative of SSAB, switches steel production away from fossil fuels with the delivery of green steel.

HYBRIT aims to replace coking coal - traditionally needed for ore-based steel making - with fossil-free electricity and hydrogen. The SSAB site in Luleå, Sweden, was the pilot plant in which work began in 2018. Direct Reduced Iron (DRI), also known as sponge iron, is the virgin material that is used together with recycled scrap for steelmaking. Substitution of coking

coal with hydrogen is said to reduce emissions from steelmaking by at least 90%. Constructions are on to build a pilot hydrogen storage facility around 25-35 meters below the ground, with operations set to begin from 2022 to 2024.

Volvo sets out to begin the manufacturing of prototype vehicles using green steel by the end of 2021. The full-scale production of the material will start in 2026. Mercedes-Benz has also entered a partnership with SSAB to manufacture vehicles with fossil-free steel as soon as possible, with the prototype parts for body shells planned for next year.

The company has broadened its horizons and partnered with Cargotec to begin coordinated development, introducing fossil-free steel in its cargo handling equipment.

Sir Lewis Wins His 100th as Russian **GP Comes to a Thrilling Conclusion**

Sir Lewis Hamilton clinched a century of wins as he won a chaotic Russian Grand Prix from his championship rival, Max Verstappen, taking the lead in this year's championship. The Briton now has 9 more race wins than Schumacher, who is second on the list, and more than Senna, Fangio and Lauda managed combined - winning 9.6% of all races ever.

After a wet qualifying session in which Hamilton crashed embarrassingly at the treacherous pit entry,

Lando Norris started from pole with Carlos Sainz alongside him, and future Mercedes driver George Russell started from third. Verstappen, Bottas and Leclerc started from the back - serving engine penalties. The race starting in idyllic conditions, though, meant that there was a free tyre

Hamilton got a poor getaway on lights out but gained some ground after picking up a tow, only to get boxed in and lose positions. Sainz took the lead of the race, though tyre deg-

radation allowed Norris to overtake him back later. Cunning strategy calls and brilliant race management enabled Sir Lewis and Mercedes to fight for victory on the hards.

The scene was set for Mc-Laren's second win in a row - and Norris's maiden - until disaster struck with 5 laps to go. The heavens opened on the seafront side at Sochi. Norris chose to stay out on slicks whilst his compatriot, Hamilton, pitted for intermediates. The rain started lashing down harder, meaning Lando was careening, and Sir Lewis could swoop past him with exemplary ease. Verstappen, who was running in seventh, found himself in second following the chaos.

With seven rounds to go and a two-point gap between the title contenders, "every single race is a cup final" Christian Horner, team-principal Red-Bull Racing Honda told F1 Media. Source: F1 Media




